

Canada Day celebrations

The hottest spot in town this weekend will be Coronation Park and Bronte in Oakville, where thousands of people are celebrating Canada's 125th birthday.

Canada Day festivities are planned by the Town and the Halton Multicultural Council. From Monday at 11 a.m. to Saturday night, there's something for everyone in the Bronte Bazaar street fair,加上 a fireworks display on July 1.

With a multitude of games, contests, singing, dancing, drums, fireworks and more, it all adds up to one gigantic party no matter which day or time you plan to visit.

Although Oakville Museum doesn't have special Canada Day events, admission to the Museum facilities will be free on July 1st. There are two special living exhibits at the Museum, giving up-to-date Days and Games at the Old Post Office building in Lakeside Park and the War of 1812 at the Customs House at the long 1 Navy Street. There are also tours of the recently renovated Kitchell estate.

If the hot weather continues and you need a refresher, drop by Bronte Creek Provincial Park, which is open on the holiday Monday, for a dip in the 1.6 acre man-made pool (it's chilly open tomorrow).

You can also celebrate Canada's pre-Confederation years at the Halton Region Museum between 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. on July 1. There, military re-enactors representing the 12th York Battalion of Infantry and the 16th Irish Brigade will square off against each other in their re-enactment of the famous Fenian Raids, originally fought in the Niagara Peninsula area in 1865 and 1866.

In addition to viewing military performances, visitors to the Museum on Canada Day will have the opportunity to taste home-made ice cream. Admission to all Museum exhibits and public buildings will be free. The Museum is located seven kilometers west of Milton on Regional Road 28 in Kelso Conservation Area. The Kelso gate fee will still be in effect on the holiday weekend.

You can also celebrate Canada's birthday at the Ontario Agricultural Museum between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. There will be a puppet show, craft workshop, wagon rides and musical entertainment by the Waterloo Playford Players. The Museum's costumed interpreters will re-create an historic Dominion Day in a dramatic presentation. The Museum is located five kilometers west of Milton, take Hwy 40 to exit 320 or 312 south and follow signs.

A complete listing of local Canada Day celebrations follows. In the event of rain, the festivities will be moved indoors to Oakville Arena on

CORONATION PARK:

11 a.m. to 1 p.m.: Live music will be provided by the Caribbean Steel Band, the Silvertones and Mr. Toot's Wild Band.

1 p.m.: Opening ceremonies featuring master of ceremonies, Brian Penoff of CTV, get underway with a flag parade, the singing of the national anthem and remarks by MPP Otto Jeljek, MPP Gary Carr and Mayor Ann Mulvale.

1:30 to 5:30 p.m.:

A total of 15 performing groups will entertain crowds with everything from Irish folk dancing to East Indian music. The groups in their order of appearance beginning at 1:30 p.m., are the Goggin School of Irish Dancing, Canadian Pakistan Cultural Association, Portuguese Folkloric Dancing, Yuvakendra (East Indian), Croatian Folklore Ensemble Hrvatsko Proljeće, Ron Cormier martial arts, Oakville Slick Cultural Association, Looking Glass Band, Croatian Folklore Ensemble Blago Adriatic, Hindu

In addition to the live entertainment, there will be cultural displays and food booths. Among those setting up booths in the park include the German Canadian Club Eintracht, the Canadian Caribbean Association of Halton, the Ontario Provincial Police, Halton Rape Crisis Centre, Faneur-Furlane Italian Club and the Polish Catholic Mission, among many, many others.
